THE GIFT OF INCARNATION

How did St. Paul and St. Mark miss it? St. Luke got it. So did St. Matthew and St. John, who gave us some of the best words to understand the divine mystery of what we call the *Incarnation*.

And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth. (John 1:14)

These words of *Incarnation* from John we read every Christmas Day. (Yes, I know as you read this we are still in Advent, so maybe read this again on December 25!) By the way, December 25 as Jesus' birthday was assigned by tradition, not scripture, as is the word Christmas.

We also call Christmas *The Nativity of our Lord Jesus Christ*, and we read the *Nativity* story on Christmas Eve. It's what Christmas pageants are made of, the words from Matthew and Luke about angels, shepherds, Mary, Joseph, the babe in the manger. It's all very cozy, cute, tender, and joyful, as most births are.

Even so, the word *nativity* seems too small when held beside the word *Incarnation*. God taking on human flesh, or as we say in the Creed: "God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God....For us and for our salvation, he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit, he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary and was made man."

I grew up at Emmanuel Episcopal Church in Athens, Georgia, and since Emmanuel means 'God with us,' this deep truth of Incarnation, God with us, the word becoming flesh became part of me early on. Later on in seminary, the intellectual caught up with what my soul had known. I guess that's how a lot of faith works: *faith seeking understanding*, as the saying goes.

At other times in the church year, and in most of Paul's theology, Crucifixion and Resurrection take center stage. In addition, Paul does not speak of nativity—of baby Jesus—neither does St. Mark.That fact acknowledged, we would have never gotten to Crucifixion and Resurrection and new life if we had not had this first life: the word becoming flesh.

Jesus was not chosen or tapped after his birth, not even at his birth. God's plan for our salvation even predated conception. "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God and the Word was God...and the Word became flesh and dwelt among us" (John 1:1ff). Emmanuel, God with us in ways the word *Incarnation* attempts to hold.

Thus, Incarnation is as equally important as Crucifixion and Resurrection. All three are redemption, grace and gift. Our celebrations this and every December 25 are more about life than they are about nativity and birth itself. A life shared. A life sacrificed. A life redeemed. God dwelling among us, God with us, so that we can be with God, now and forever. Amen.
