

DANCING WITH GOD

The question, "Why do good things happen to bad people?" is one you have heard before, and many answers have been given. I recently stumbled upon one such answer, offered by the first priest and mentor I had out of seminary, Barbara Brown Taylor. Always the wordsmith and the faithsmith, she uses the story of Joseph being sold by his brothers as the springboard to her answer in the sermon entitled, "Listening to your Life." s, created a mess and came back to the dance. Redemption. Peter was invited back onto the dance floor by lesus even after his toe-stepping betrayals with the words, "Peter do you love me... feed my sheep."

"God does not live way up above us somewhere, pulling the strings and calling the shots, but God lives right here in the midst of us, giving us our freedom and holding the divine breath while we make our choices. Sometimes they are very good and sometimes they are very bad. Either way, God does not leave. God is committed to us and to working through us, which is what divine providence is all about. Contrary to what most of us have been taught, it is not about God's will overriding our own. It is more like a dance, that totally mysterious dance that takes place between God's freedom and our freedom, between God's will and our own. In this dance, it is not God's job to keep bad things from happening. They do happen. Brothers turn against brothers [like Joseph's brothers did to him, selling him into slavery]. People are bought and sold. Famine devastates the land. God's job is not to prevent these things from happening. God's job is to stay present in them and to keep on being God, creating whole worlds out of total chaos, breathing life into piles of dust, taking the unfathomable wreckage of our lives and making something fine out of them in spite of us. Because that is who God is."

Though her answer does not put the question to rest (no answer, I think, ever could), it does help with the simple statement, "[Bad things] do happen." They often happen because of human choices, like we read in Prayer C: 'we turned against you, and betrayed your trust, and we turned against one another." Or in terms of Barbara Taylor's other image, we decided to stop dancing with God.

I've always liked to dance, so I like the image of dancing with God. That images is a lot better than wrestling with God, which Joseph's father Jacob did, to which his dislocated hip can attest. Dancing with God could be a couple's dance (tango or slow sway) or dancing with God could be a group dancing together, like at a wedding reception, using the beat of the band to create some common rhythmic movements at the same time each person expresses individual flare. Maybe a group dance symbolizes what congregations do—have a group dance with God.

How we choose, how we use our freedom and choose to dance as congregations with God (in the midst of good things and bad things happening) is a testament our faith and trust in God, to our desire to be on the dance floor in the first place. And I might say, the last thing we want to do in this dance is step on God's toes —or forget who is in the lead.

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BAZAAR BARN CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

Good Shepherd Announces A Legacy of Community Capital Campaign to Fund Purchase of New Bazaar Barn Building





Good Shepherd announced during the Parish Summer Meeting on June 28th plans to purchase the New Bazaar Barn building at 1846 Highway 107 North. We have been renting the building for several months and we will close on the purchase in late November.

A Legacy of Community Capital Campaign has already raised over \$700,000 toward the purchase price of \$1.5M. We are grateful to the Barn Board, Outreach Committee and Vestry for their 100% participation in this effort. During the quiet phase of the Campaign, we have also secured major lead gifts from several parishioners.









As many of you know, when Covid struck in 2020 the annual Auction and Bazaar was cancelled. Sharon Sticker and her team put on their masks and began opening the Furniture Warehouse a few weekends a month, and then every weekend. This pivot was loved by volunteers, donors, and shoppers. Sales increased dramatically.

However, the furniture warehouse was never intended to be a retail space. It lacked HVAC, was prone to flooding and parking was challenging. Following prayerful consideration, lively debates, an exhaustive search and more than a few sleepless nights, nearly the perfect alternative was found.


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Good Shepherd Announces A Legacy of Community Capital Campaign to Fund Purchase of New Bazaar Barn Building (cont.)









The new Bazaar Barn has a bright, safe selling space, adequate storage, excellent road visibility, parking for almost 50 cars, HVAC, and larger square footage. Renting the building before we purchased has demonstrated just how successful the new space will be. Year-over-year sales increased 108% in May.

Our goal is to fund a major portion of the purchase price through the Capital Campaign. We will mortgage the balance. We hope to keep the mortgage as small as possible, so we can increase our outreach grants. Did you know the Bazaar Barn's net proceeds go into the Outreach Grant budget to fund the efforts of local charities – never to pay for any church expenses? By 2019, the Bazaar Barn had grown to such a level that we were granting over \$150,000 per year and in 2023 our grants total almost \$300K.

HOLY MEN & WOMEN OF JULY

Anne Pauline Murray, Pauli Murray Episcopal Priest and Activist, 1910-1985 July 1



Rev'd Murray was one of the first woman and its first black woman ordained in the Episcopal church in 1977. An educator, lawyer and an activist for civil rights, gender discrimination, and for the LGBT+ community they also coined the term Jane Crow addressing both misogyny and racism in the life of women of color from the late 1940s to their death. Murray was one of 12 cofounders of National Organization for Women, and a professor of African-American Studies at Brandies University. The author of several books including Proud Shoes, Dark Testament, Song in aWeary Throat and posthumously, Speak a Defiant Word: Sermons and Speeches on Justice and Transformation, confronted misogyny at Howard University, and Yale University where she was the first African- American graduate of Yale

law school. Although born in Baltimore she lived her grandparents in Durham, North Caroline until moving to Washington, D.C. to attend Howard at 16. There is wonderful film about their life, My Name Is Pauli Murray.

Liberating God, we thank you for the steadfast courage of your servant Pauli Murray, who fought long and well: Unshackle us from the chains of prejudice and fear, that we may show forth the reconciling love and true freedom which you revealed in your Son our Savior Jesus Christ; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. 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HOLY MEN & WOMEN OF JULY

Samson Occom Witness to the Faith, 1723-1792 July 14



Born in a wigwam on Mohegan land, Samson Occom was one of the first ordained Christian Indian ministers. Occom's popularity as an eloquent teacher and spiritual leader grew with Indians over a large part of New England. To accommodate this interest, he decided to form a New England Christian Indian School. The church sent him to England to raise funds, where he collected eleven thousand pounds from wealthy patrons, such as the Earl of Dartmouth and King George. When he returned however, he found his family destitute and his school moved to Hanover, New Hampshire, where it became Dartmouth College. This disappointment was followed by the Connecticut Colony's ruling that

the Mohegans would not be compensated for land they sold to the colony. With the Tribe increasingly penniless and powerless, Occom accepted an invitation for his group to resettle with the upstate New York Oneida. He hoped their new home in Brothertown, New York would free them from additional disappointment. His legacy for the Mohegan people who remained in Connecticut was a reputation for being Christianized, which helped them avoid later relocation.

In April of 2022, Dartmouth College finally agreed to return Occom's papers to the Mohegan Tribe. These papers include some of the earliest examples of written Mohegan Language, an autobiography, letters, and journals.

God, the Great Spirit, whose breath gives life to the world and whose voice thunders in the wind: We give you thanks for your servant Samson Occom, strong preacher and teacher among the Mohegan people; and pray that we, cherishing his example, may love learning and by love build up the communities into which you send us; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, now and forever. Sadly, bad choices (toe-stepping) and self-will (forgetting of who is in the lead) has happened from Joseph's brothers to Judas to us. Some of the bad things that happen are because of us, not because of natural disasters or other things out of our control. In either case, our faithful God dances on. As Barbara Taylor points out, God does not leave (the dance floor). Instead God takes "the unfathomable wreckage of our lives and making something fine out of them in spite of us." That's redemption. That's God's choice.

Why do bad things happen is one question. How does one respond to bad things, that's the other question. The Prodigal Son made choices, created a mess and came back to the dance. Redemption. Peter was invited back onto the dance floor by Jesus even after his toe-stepping betrayals with the words, "Peter do you love me...feed my sheep."

Using our freedom to stay engaged and in rhythm with God and with each other—especially when bad things happen—is key.

As we think about freedom this July 4—not political freedoms but spiritual freedoms and choices—may we also remember that we need each other, that we are all invited to dance by a faithful and loving God. Redemption from bad things comes from God who leads the way and from us as church dancing together to God's faithful beat.

The words of that old folk tune are true: "I'll lead you all wherever you may be and I'll lead you all in the dance said he."
